Abstract				
This paper summarizes the CCP data submission that was performed under the requirements of CMM 2022/02 (data standards). In 2022, Eight CCPs (out of 13) provided data to the Secretariat for fishing activities performed in 2021. Most of the datasets received followed the CMM requirements and used the templates proposed by the Secretariat.

1. Introduction

CMM 2022/02 (Data Standards) instructs CCPs to submit the catch summaries, catch and effort and observer data, pertaining to the past year fishing activities.

2. Data submission

In 2022, eight CCPs that were fishing in 2021 provided data to the Secretariat as summarized in table 1.
